

These things would not be possible without our amazing board and



Women's Bureau | U.S. Department of Labor | August 30, 2023

Since 1948, when the U.S. government began collecting data on labor force participation among women, the participation rate of women ages 25-54 ("prime-age" workers) has more than doubled.



## The Importance of Farmworkers, As Told by One of Their Daughters Wage and Hour Division | US Department of Labor | July 2023

For decades, the <u>Wage and Hour Division</u> has prioritized the enforcement of farmworkers' rights. Since 2000, we've recovered over \$82 million in back wages for more than 176,000 workers in the agricultural industry. And because their employers sometimes fail to provide these workers with safe housing and transportation, clean drinking water in the fields and other requirements, we've assessed more than \$70 million in civil money penalties in the past 23 years.

But the impact of our efforts to protect farmworkers is about more than just these numbers – it's about how we improve workers' lives. In fact, for some of our employees, protecting farmworkers' rights is personal. Esther Del Toro, an enforcement coordinator in our Southwest Regional Office, is also a daughter of a farmworker. When she comes to work each day, she brings memories of her childhood with her.

"Seeing pictures of farmworkers brings to mind the early 1980s, when times were tough for my family. My father worked in the strawberry fields in California for some time until he was able to find another job closer to home in Los Angeles," Del Toro said.

## What jobs are off-limits for kids?

Wage and Hour Division | US Department of Labor | July 2023

Below are places and types of work that are off-limits for kids under 18 according to the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) and its regulations. There are additional rules for 14- and 15-year-olds and kids under 16 who work on ranches and farms. Employers are legally responsible for the safety and well-being of teen workers.

Dangerous Jobs That Are Off-Limits:

- Meat Processing and Slicing
- Power-Driven Woodworking
- Compactors and Balers
- Forklifts and Skid-Steers
- Logging, Forestry and Sawmilling
- Power-Driven Bakery Machines
- Working with Metal
- Power-Driven Saws
- Roofing

- Driving
- Explosives
- Demolition
- Mining
- Radioactive Material
- Brick and Tile
- Trenching and Excavation


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
#### More about Amy:

In no particular order:


- Travel. I want to see the Great Barrier Reef, drink wine across Europe, and soak up the sun in Mexico just to name a few.
